Zero Textbook Cost (ZTC) Degree Goals

Complete pathway of courses converted to use OER or zero cost materials instead of traditional textbooks.


- Reduce costs

\$2,127,336 in SAVINGS

That's a huge number per capita, as compared to larger CSUs. With nearly 50% of CSU students facing food insecurity & over 10% facing homelessness, this also means CI's students have more money for **basic needs!**

Open Educational Resources

... high-quality teaching, learning, and research resources that reside in the public domain or have been released pursuant to an intellectual property license that permits their free use and repurposing by others, and may include other resources that are legally available and free of cost to students.

California Education Code Section 78052(a)





Zero Textbook Cost Degrees Phase 1 (2017-19)

- \$5 million total allocation
- Grants up to \$150,000
- 26 grantees
- 34 certificates & degrees
- Technical Assistance







... community college degrees or career education certificates earned entirely by completing courses that eliminate conventional textbook costs by using alternative instructional materials and methodologies, including open educational resources

California Education Code Section 78052(a)

This course will examine the fundamental connections between equity, open educational resources (OER), guided pathways, and zero textbook cost (ZTC) programs. We will explore how ZTC pathways can help to reduce equity gaps, particularly at California Community Colleges.

ZTC Degree Projected Impact 3 Years

- Affected students: 23, 373
- 34 certificate and degree programs
- Time frame: 3 years
- Cost savings anticipated \$42,912,828





- n = 40,000










Figure 1. Satisfaction with OER (Percentage)



Improved Outcomes with OER at COC

Fall 2018	OER	Not OER	COLLEGE OF THE CANYONS
Retention	89%	87%	
Success	73%	70%	

- Success rates for Latinx male students grew from 58% in 17FA to 66% in 18FA.
- Success rates for Pell grant recipients grew from 69% in 17FA to 71% in 18FA.
- Success rates for Latinx, male, Pell recipients grew from 60% in 17FA to 67% in 18FA.
- Success rates for African American, Pell recipients grew from 57% in 17FA to 63% in 18FA.

OER Closes Equity Gaps: National Study

OER vs commercial	Change Grade	Change DFW
All Students	+8.6	-2.68%
Non-Pell Eligible	+7.4%	-2%
Pell Eligible	+12.3%	-4.4%
Non-White	+13%	-5%
Part-Time	+28%	-10%

ZTC Grantee Success Data

- Grades for all students: +3.1%
- Female students: +3.2%
- Non-White students: +3.1%
- Pell Recipients: +7.6%
- Success rates: +2.5%
- Grades of A: +7.3%
- Grades of D: 15.6%
- Grades of F: 11.2%

- 179,050 letter-graded outcomes
- ZTC courses = 37,475 (21%)
- Non-ZTC courses = 141,575 (79%)

Student Impact Stories

San Jose State University OER Student Advocate



Jenifer Vang is a biology major in her senior year at San Jose State University. She is one of eight California state university and community college students selected to launch the statewide OER Student Advocacy Network. The goal of the network is to promote the use of OER on campuses and develop a toolkit to train other students in OER advocacy.

Tell us about any barriers that you've encountered or made it difficult for you to stay on track towards graduation.

I grew up as a first-generation student from a really big immigrant family. My dad told me in high school that he wouldn't be able to financially support me so I would have to search for scholarships or take out loans to attend college. One of the biggest barriers though was that my whole life has revolved around my family so moving to San Jose State to pursue

higher education meant I had to learn how to pursue my education without worrying about what's going on at home or what I should be doing to help the family. That was really hard for me.

One of my goals as I went into university was to avoid or keep my loans to a minimum. That wasn't possible because it was so expensive and I had to use all my financial aid to just cover bills and tuition. I was looking for a job on-campus when I learned about the Affordable Learning Solutions (ALS)

Vision for Success & ZTC

Vision for Success	ZTC Programs	
Increase completion by 20%	National surveys show more than 50% of students take fewer or different classes due to textbook costs.	
	Course throughput data from Tidewater Community College shows increased average throughput in ZTC courses of 6%	
Increase transfers by 35%	50% of the ZTC programs are AS-T or AA-T; increased throughput in these programs will increase the number of students eligible for transfer	
Decrease number of excess units taken	ZTC programs offer courses in a deliberate, pathway model.	
Increase % of CTE students working in their field	40% of the ZTC programs are in CTE areas.	
Reduce equity gaps by 40%	OER/ZTC courses help reduce equity gaps (University of Georgia study)	
	High textbook prices disproportionately impact underserved students (CSUCI study)

\$10 million for ZTC!

- Supported by CCC Chancellor's Office
- Supported by Department of Finance
- Loved by Governor Newsom!
- Tied to Vision for Success
- Tied to Student Equity Plans
- Removes cost barrier in courses so students can get back in the workforce more quickly





What's in the \$10 million for ZTC?

- \$ going directly to colleges for:
 - 44 AA/AS-T grants
 - 44 Certificates
 - Librarians to Use for Professional Development
 - Technical Assistance
- \$ to CCCCO for ZTC support





And then came COVID-19....

- Funding was removed from CA 2020-2021 budget
- ZTC Funding is needed even more now!
 - Gives students a way to stay in school, which...
 - Gives students a way to complete their CCC education, which...
 - Gives colleges a way to keep more enrollment, which...
 - Gives colleges a way to recover from COVID-19!
 - Be proactive about advocating for ZTC funding!
